Charter is requesting a grant to construct a last-mile fiber FTTP via EPON to provide service to unserved households throughout the Pee Dee Region of South Carolina. This project includes the following 7 counties: Chesterfield, Darlington, Dillon, Florence, Lee, Marion, and Marlboro. Charter's strategy in developing its 2023 ARPA Grant Program CPF 1.0 submissions was based upon engagement and collaboration with key government and non-profit entities. As described throughout this application, Charter's proposal is a product of valuable partnerships throughout the region to assess and identify local needs to help communities, the South Carolinians they serve, and local economies thrive in the new digital world.

Describe how your proposal meets the needs of the community to be served as described in the "Guidelines."

Consistent with the objectives of the 2023 ARPA Grant Program CPF 1.0 guidance, Charter's collaboration with the communities within the proposed project area will primarily focus upon locations in need, affordability, adoption, and digital literacy. This includes ongoing discussions with the counties, localities, and other community stakeholders to identify local residents, businesses, and anchor institutions that are lacking access to high-speed, reliable broadband service. While using the South Carolina Broadband Office's (SCBBO) fabric locations on the eligibility map, Charter has consulted community stakeholders in the proposed project areas to ensure the proposed deployment achieves their local goals of expanding service to those in need. In addition to consultations regarding the geographic coverage outlined in Charter's proposal, Charter has reviewed its product offerings and participation in the FCC's Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP) to ensure the packages that we offer will meet the affordability needs of the communities that would be served. Lastly, Charter's commitment to increasing adoption and digital literacy has also involved local engagement, wherein Charter discussed our local commitments to address these important issues across the communities to be served. More information regarding such programs is addressed below in the application.

In addition to working with communities throughout the Pee Dee Region, Charter is also partnering with Marlboro Pee Dee Electric (MPD) to promote a swift buildout throughout the region. For more information regarding our partnership with MPD, please see the attached letter of support from their President & CEO, Mr. William Fleming.

Charter recognizes the critical fact that each day without connectivity increases the gap between those who have broadband and those who do not. In this proposal, Charter aims to close this digital divide by offering to build the **1,482 RDOF locations** identified in this Project within the specified timeline of this grant program at no cost to the state. Moreover, Charter is proposing to build an additional **1,973 locations as a part of the state grant program**. This will result in a **total build of 3,455 locations throughout Anderson County, South Carolina**.

Describe your plans or programs you will implement to improve adoption in the community described in this proposal.

Charter is committed to ensuring that more South Carolinians have access to high-quality, reliable broadband. As we continue to expand our network to cover more communities in South Carolina, we remain focused on increasing our customer's awareness of our various service offerings.

Charter has offered affordable broadband in South Carolina for many years. Due to advances in technology and enhancements to our network, the speeds we offer today are dramatically faster than years ago, and we are continually increase those speeds, most recently raising our download speeds for our flagship offering to 300Mbps.

Charter is proud to be engaged in several initiatives and various business practices that benefit consumers in need and demonstrate our commitment to the communities we serve. For example, the Affordable Connectivity Program ("ACP"), which Charter participates in, provides a \$30 discount on internet service for eligible customers.

As required by the program, Charter has also created a low-cost offering (100/20 Mbps) that has no income requirements (as indicated in section 1.7 of this application).

This included discussions about Charter's affordable service offerings, it's participation in the FCC's Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP), and Charter's willingness to host events to increase awareness of its affordable service options in the proposed project area.</p> <p>Furthermore, if granted an award in the Pee Dee Region, Charter is committed to working with the county and its localities to 1) make residents aware of its various service offerings, 2) inform residents about initiatives that are available to address service affordability, and 3) any other needs identified by the county or localities to increase overall awareness, adoption, and digital literacy regarding the high-speed broadband services that will become available as a result of this network expansion.</p>

Charter's efforts include general proactive and event-based engagement with state and local emergency services agencies to best coordinate Charter's restoration efforts with other key infrastructure stakeholders.</p> <p>Continuity risks are multifaceted in nature and include the impact of weather events, which Charter frequently analyzes through incident assessment process.
