

Describe Applicant's and/or project Partner's experience building and/or operating broadband networks.

Over the past two years, Lynches River Electric Cooperative (LREC) has led the way in creating equal access to high-speed, fiber internet in Chesterfield, Lancaster and Kershaw counties. Beginning in the fall of 2019, well before the COVID-19 pandemic reinvigorated the community focus on broadband internet for rural communities, LREC and RiverNet Connect began overseeing the development and execution of engineering plans to serve over 7,000 homes. Since connecting the first RiverNet customer in September of 2020, RiverNet's customers have grown to over 1,350 throughout the LREC service territory with more joining each day. The current network provides the highest quality fiber service over 500 miles of line in the three different counties. The network is maintained by an experienced group of dedicated employees with over 125 combined years of experience in the broadband industry.

LREC, in conjunction with its fiber subsidiary, has made a priority of identifying underserved and unserved areas throughout Chesterfield, Lancaster and Kershaw counties. As a matter of fact, all the areas identified in this application are categorized as 0 percent 25/3 access as indicated on the ORS unserved areas map. We recognize the positive exponential impact that equal access to broadband can have on the community we serve and the implications that access to broadband has on a student's access to quality education. Because of this connection, we are committed to providing our community and each of its citizens with access to world class internet service regardless of where an individual resides.

As we expand our service area, we continue to identify and prioritize our most vulnerable communities throughout the three counties we serve. Each of our currently active zones bring service to rural areas and bring high-speed internet to previously unserved homes. Our team also recognized the inequity in access for families of a lower socioeconomic status and is actively targeting specific communities with high poverty levels in comparison to the state average.

Rome wasn't built in a day and neither are fiber optic networks. At Lynches River Electric Cooperative, we desperately wish we could connect every consumer in need immediately. Though we all recognize this impossibility, our construction crews have been working with unmatched dedication to reach as many consumers as possible, as quickly as possible. In order to subsidize traditional fiber service, we have developed the Community Fiber initiative to accelerate access to internet for a greater number of individuals. Through our Community Fiber initiative, LREC and RiverNet have partnered with community leaders to identity churches and community centers that serve as gathering places for citizens. RiverNet and LREC have prioritized these locations to receive service and have donated equipment to create free community fiber hotspots. These hotspots have the capability to provide 300 Mbps speeds to at least 50 devices at one time. At this time, there are three active Community Hotspots located in Pageland, Heath Springs and the Buford Community. In addition, we have the equipment on hand to create seven additional hot spot locations as we broaden our service area and identify areas that are most in need of access to internet.

In addition, RiverNet is hosting community information sessions to educate consumers on the various benefits and components of fiber optic internet. These sessions will provide information on virtual tools like Zoom, streaming services, wireless routers, hotspots and more. In addition, employee experts will be on hand to answer questions and troubleshoot common problems consumers are experiencing. We hope this initiative will remove the knowledge barrier many underserved communities face.

Finally, in response to requests from some of our underprivileged and underserved community members, RiverNet has begun offering an installation option that does not require an install fee. Our member service representatives quickly realized that the set-up fee prevented many community members from accessing high-quality internet service. As we continue with this project, our team will remain reactive and responsive to the needs of our community to ensure we create the highest possibly adoption level possible, especially in our most vulnerable communities.
